



AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS 2022

It appears like a small miracle that the National Championships in NSW on 17-18 September 2022 happened at all. After first needing to be postponed because of COVID restrictions, the field was then moved last minute due to the local council double booking Surveyors Creek Recreation Area. Fortunately, an alternative venue was found, and after much frantic last-minute communications, we were able to hold our National Championships at Grey Gums Oval in Cranebrook instead.

The event was very well organized by Takeshi and Jess Honda. Thanks to Jess running a tight ship, we got through all the competitions on Saturday and were free to enjoy the fun events on Sunday. Saturday's weather was dominated by strong but patchy winds, with some sudden showers adding to the challenge.

The first event, MTA, started out with the winds still down in the first round, but blowing relentlessly after that. Many brilliant throws ended in competitors having to chase after hovering 'rangs, ending up outside the throwing field. Chris Johnson won the event with an outstanding throw of 51.08 seconds.

Next up was Trick Catch. I was happy that the event organisers made the sensible decision to drop the doubling part of this competition. It was amazing to see how (despite of the gusty winds) Takeshi, Thomas Szartowicz and Grant Perry managed to throw consistently and successfully got most of their catches. Thomas ended up taking out the event out with a score of 81 out of the possible 100.

The Fast Catch event was a little randomized by the patchy winds, with Matt Barker from WA riding his luck with a round of 27.85 seconds. Next event was lunch, with Jess and Takeshi having organised lunch orders from Murray's Sandwich Shop nearby.

Blow me down, next event was the one I was hoping not to have straight after lunch-Endurance! Grant won this event with a whopping 41, which was very impressive in that kind of weather. Accuracy followed and I was very happy to see newcomer Michael Towel from our NSW throwing group take out the event with 38 out of a possible 100. Aussie Round concluded the day, with throwers not only battling with the strong winds, but also having to throw towards the setting sun. Again, I was not surprised, to see Takeshi replicate persistently brilliant throwing and catching to win with a total of 51 points.

We then met up for dinner, followed by the AGM at Kingswood Sports Club. I was very happy about the outcome, that the BAA voted to reward pioneering and outstanding Australian throwers with lifetime membership. First up, Tony Butz and Jeff Lewry were appointed on the night, with others like Bob Burwell and Rod Jones to follow soon, hopefully.

On Sunday, we had loads of fun with a leisurely round of 'Closest to the Pin,' won by Thomas then followed by the Hunting Stick Event. Roger Perry was able to replicate his recent success at the Team World Cup in France, being the only one hitting the 'Skippy' target from 50 metres.

At the conclusion of the awards presentation, we celebrated Thomas Szartowiczs as the winner with the overall highest score, only to learn 10 days after the event, that due to a calculation error, the actual winner was Takeshi Honda!

Our thanks go to Takeshi and Jess for organizing the event, as well as the referees Leonie Metzakis, Angie Perry and Chrissy Metzakis.

Although the Glowy material is no longer available, if you are interested in making this style for yourself, 0% and 5% glass fibre nylon Tri Fly blanks with airfoils would be the closest match.

Takeshi's comment

My mentor, Murata San, got this boomerang from Fridolin Frost. When I started throwing boomerangs, I convinced him to let me borrow it and that was now... 15yrs ago. It is my lucky charm and I always make sure it's in my kit when I travel to tournaments.

THROWER PROFILE #1

Introducing throwers from Australia

In this edition, we speak to Christene 'Chrissy' Metzakis, long time thrower and promoter of the sport boomerangs from Perth, WA.

How did you become involved in Boomerangs?

At the age of nine, I first came across boomerangs when Roger Perry, owner of Rangs Boomerangs, visited my primary school to present a sports boomerang demonstration. During after school pick up my brother John and I were lucky to be included in the newspaper article with Roger, well I poked my head out from behind them to get into the picture.

At first, I participated in social competitions on the weekends with eight or so other children and some adults. Then I helped with Roger's Friday and Saturday night boomerang shows. These shows featured a choregraphed LED light show with glow sticks, sparklers to techno music. They attracted massive crowds from all over WA. I also helped SpinBack Boomerangs and then Rangs boomerangs with making, packaging and selling at the Fremantle markets.



What kind of boomerang did you start throwing with?

An Aussie Fever was my first boomerang, and it came from Roger. It was candy apple pink and I absolutely loved it. Unfortunately, it got lost in the long grass while we were throwing in the park.



Do you have a favourite?

My all-time favourite is Roger's Flying Fox boomerang. I've been throwing it since I was around 9-10 years old and even though it's weighty, I was able to get it to come back. I often used it in Aussie Round event in my early days of competing. Since then, my collection has grown, but I only had Roger's boomerangs when I started.



Which was the most memorable competition that you have competed in?

That would probably have to be the 2021 QLD Nationals. We had flown on a Red Eye flight which was delayed so we didn't arrive until the morning of the competition. Once we touched down, we had to rush off the plane and get to the field just in time to throw MTA.

Although arriving was stressful, I managed to set two new Australian ladies records! These were in Endurance (27), Fast Catch (26.84sec). I also won the Women's Throwstick competition (50m- 3rd overall). Especially after COVID lockdowns, it was great to get together and see everyone encourage each other.



What do you hope to achieve in the future?

Before I stop throwing, my aim is to beat all the Australian female event records. At this stage, I have Accuracy 50, Aussie Round and MTA left to beat.

I want to continue to spread the love of boomerangs and throwing sport boomerangs! I hope that through initiatives such as Boomergals (@boomergals) and WABA (@waboomerang) we can see more women throwing around the world as well as reintroduce the sport in WA and rest of Australia.



What are your personal achievements within sport boomerangs?

My personal achievements include traveling overseas twice, representing Australia at the World Cup in France and in India and the personal/Australian records I have achieved: Accuracy 100 (66pts- 2006), Fast Catch (26.84sec- 2021), Endurance (27 catches- 2021), Trick catch (28- 1999).

I am currently the Secretary of BAA, Secretary of WABA, IFBA Media Manager and own Fremantle Boomerangs, a small business stall at the Fremantle Markets, originally started by Sam Blight, then Roger and now me in the exact same location since 1982 with my partner Chris Johnson and with the help of mum in Perth, WA.

THROWER PROFILE #2

Introducing throwers from around the world

I first discovered my love for boomerangs when I was a little boy and saw a short film called 'Mickey Down Under', but it was not until 2001 when I got the chance to purchase my very first rang. I got it from a science museum while visiting Colombia's capital, Bogota.

A few months later, I stumbled upon a small wooden sign outside a house in my hometown of Medellin that read 'Sport of Boomerangs,' which happened to be the home of Oscar Cuartas. Oscar taught me the basics of boomerang throwing and how they work, and I even managed to build and sell a few rangs myself before moving to Australia and taking a break from the sport due to some health issues.



Nationals in Runaway Bay, QLD, in 2021 proved to be a game-changer for me. Not only did I have the pleasure of meeting some amazing people and renowned throwers who reignited my passion for boomerang throwing, but I also had the good fortune of connecting with David Schummy.

As a boomerang legend and one of the very few throwers in Brisbane, David's expertise and enthusiasm for the sport helped me to grow my interest in throwing at a competitive level.

Motivated by David's mentorship and my renewed love for boomerang throwing, I participated in my first competition the following year, in 2022 at the NSW National Competition. I was thrilled to achieve second and third place finishes in the Aussie Round and Fast Catch events, respectively, marking a significant first milestone in my journey as a boomerang thrower.



I arrived in Paris a week before the World Cup was due to start in August 2022 but unfortunately my suitcase was still in Singapore, so I decided to head off to Bordeaux without it. It arrived the day before the World Cup started and thankfully so, because it had all the boomerangs for the Team Indo in it!

Team Indo was made up of three Indians- Sunil Uikey, Jay Singh Yadav, Philip Sathyaraj and three Indonesians- Denis Suprana, Fahmi Amurullah, Rafid Lajuhnka. Yudhiana Ardisoma brought the throwers from Indonesia and Vivek Montrose came with the throwers from India. Christene Metzakis also helped our team, and I coached.



The day before the cup started, I had the chance to train the Indian throwers and was very impressed by their raw talent. It was great to have Sunil, who is also a lefty, as he could use my competition boomerangs and has a lot of power.

On day one of the team event, I did not expect too much from the team as none of them had ever competed at an international level. However, to my surprise, they all did an amazing job and worked well together in the team events. There were many highlights, including a near perfect round of Trick Catch by 16-year-old Rafid. He certainly was not daunted by the big stage! Our team finished 9th overall, so a good start.

On day two, I wasn't sure what to expect but the team just lifted. This was especially the case with Denis, who showed everyone that he is going to be a future World Champion!

From memory, Denis had 13 catches in the Team Endurance event and then added another 5 catches to bring the team home at the end. I had asked him to play safe, but I'm so glad he did his own thing and went hard and fast- the only way he knows!

The team also did well in the Team Supercatch event, with all the throwers catching their MTAs and good results in the Fast Catch.

On day three I assumed that, after two consecutive days of throwing, the team might be burnt, but boy was I wrong! The whole team lifted again, with amazing results in Team Supercatch and all events on that day.

I was very proud of the Team Indo. They came in at 2nd place in Team Supercatch event, 4th place in the Trick event and finished in 6th position overall. The entire team can be proud of their first ever World Cup. They worked well together and congratulations to them all!



Following the Teams Cup, we had a few days rest with an excursion to Cape Ferret and a beautiful seafood lunch on the beach. A new IFBA board was elected, with Gunter Moeller staying on as President and Roger Perry as Vice President. Christene Metzakis was elected as Media Manager to work on the website and Facebook.

Then we had the Individual World Championships. The competition was won by Brazilian Andre Caixa Ribeiro, who was just fantastic over the entire event. The lady's competition was taken out by Marie Appriou.

One of the highlights of the individual comp was when Indonesian Champion Denis Suprana blitzed everyone to win Endurance with 61 catches. What a place to do your personal best!

Denis finished just outside the Top 10 overall.

WITH LOUE? FROM DEHLI

If you want to visit Delhi, it's important to have a sense of adventure. As soon as you enter the city's roads in a taxi, you will discover how Delhi operates- the traffic is chaotic and dangerous.

There are road rules, but nobody follows them- cars zigzag within inches of each other among tuk-tuks, bicycles, motorcycles and donkey carts. Cows venture across highways with a slow wandering grace and occasionally you meet head-on traffic! The roads buzz all day and through the night without pause amidst a cacophony of tooting horns.

The buildings look good but come with a multitude of functional problems. We had to laugh when we found that the shower heads in our hotel were broken, so we had to stand under a sheet of water that flooded the bathroom floor. Unfortunately, some of us became sick with 'Delhi Belly', but our excellent tour host Lily gave us a local remedy to stop it.

Despite these cultural shocks, Delhi, India was one of the most fascinating holiday experiences I have had. In the short time I was there, I was able to visit a few of the city's many significant monuments.

My tourism highlight was the relatively new cultural centre – Akshardham. Akshardham is an enormous site covering 100 acres, situated near the banks of the Yamuna River. Built in early the 2000s, it only took 5 years to build. 7000 artisans were assigned specific tasks and worked in separate cities, villages and towns, to create meticulous stories in stone that, when completed, came together like an enormous jigsaw puzzle.

We were not permitted to take photographs, but if you're curious, have a look at the tremendous architectural achievement (that would have taken Australian's, with all their work policies, 100 years to build) here: https://akshardham.com



But why was I in India you ask? Along with other Australian Throwers, I was invited by Delhi Government Officials to participate in the first ever Australia vs India Boomerang Competition.

During the tournament India fought hard, beating the Aussies in the Team Relay. I was impressed by the young throwers as they were incredibly fast runners! Ultimately, however, the Indian team was beaten by the experience of the Australian team.



I loved the small part of India I saw and the friendly people we met along the way. Although it is rare to find any Western travellers in Delhi and nearby parts, everyone was warm and hospitable and loved taking photographs with us. This experience has opened my eyes to India, and I hope to return one day. I plan to travel all over the country to learn more of India's history; what the British travel writer William Dalrymple describes as a 'bottomless seam of stories'.

TUNASBUMI 11

My trip to Bandung City in Java in October 2022, after the World Championships in France, gave me a chance to catch up with all the Indonesian throwers again. I flew via Bali and arrived three days before the Tunasbumi 11 Championships. As soon as we arrived, Yudhiana Ardisoma, the tournament organiser, arranged a car to take a group of us to the Tangkuban Peraho Volcano. The lake was very picturesque, and we had a lot of fun throwing boomerangs out over it. After visiting the volcano, we went to some hot springs about 8km away. They were amazing and you guessed- it very hot!

Tunasbumi 11 was held on an airbase, which got special permission to use. The field was 600m long and 250m wide. The location was amazing but unfortunately, there had been a lot of rain and the ground was soggy. So much so that I ended up throwing the entire event in bare feet!





The day started with MTA and luckily it was not too windy. Denis Suprana powered away to an easy win, but I was more than happy with my time of 35 seconds. Fast Catch was next, and the wind had started with Ahmad Khudoi Rizal, the only thrower to catch under 25 seconds.

For Endurance, I tried one of Denis' new models and it worked a treat in the wind. I was rapt to get 48 catches. The overall winner of Endurance was Fahmi Amrullah with 50 catches in the wind- a really good score.


